Dear friends and family of Grace,

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18a "Rejoice always, pray continuously, and give thanks in all circumstances."

It sounds so easy when things are going well but sometimes, we really struggle to find reasons to rejoice and give thanks - and who can pray continuously anyway? I often encourage people to find the blessings in every situation. For example, if you have a car accident, of course it is horrible. Praying might seem much more accessible at moments like this. But where are the blessings? Sometimes, we have to look hard. One blessing might be that we have insurance. Another might be no injuries or for medical care. If we look, we can find the blessings.

The way we live our lives with an attitude of gratitude and prayer really makes a difference. Studies have shown that those who live this way have increased health benefits both physically and mentally. Taking moments for rejoicing, laughing, breathing deeply in prayer, and being thankful are ways that God has given us that help us live life more fully.

The angels of Advent remind us to not live in fear for with God, all things are possible. As we move into the season of Advent this month, let's remember these celestial messengers who encourage us to rejoice, to have a relationship through prayer with God who dwells among us, and to give thanks at all times. I encourage you to try this each day. Making faith a daily habit like brushing your teeth changes our minds and



behaviors for the better in very positive ways.

Just as God comes to us in human flesh at Christmastime, we embody Christ in our everyday attitudes and behaviors. Christ dwells within us, among us, and around us. For this we give thanks and praise. Two key words for me right now are words of adaptability and flexibility. Within this framework. I am thankful that we are still church, that we have several ways to worship that fits for each person – either in person, online, on the phone, or recorded to fit each schedule – and that together, we can rejoice in the many gifts that God has given all of us. Most of all, let's rejoice with the Advent story of a promised Savior as together, we pray for the indwelling of the Word made flesh among us, and then, give thanks for all that is still possible both now and in the new year to come.

DECEMBER MISSION OF THE MONTH

Houses for Haiti is the mission of the month at Grace Lutheran Church for December. Houses for Haiti was founded by two sisters from the eastside of St. Paul after participating in a mission trip to Haiti. A few facts about Haiti - Haiti is the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere, 80% of the population lives under the poverty line, the infant mortality rate is 62%, 6 million people are unemployed, and 50% of the adult population is illiterate.

Houses for Haiti is dedicated to building houses for homeless families living on the streets of Cite Soleil, the poorest slum in the Western Hemisphere. Each family is hand picked by a trusted pastor in Cite Soleil. They have to meet certain requirements to be considered. Out of every dollar, 98 cents is applied towards a new home for a deserving family, the 2 cents is applied towards administration costs. This is a volunteer organization.

Please prayerfully consider a donation to this organization that believes that every person deserves to live in a safe environment, free from diesase and filth that is ever present on the streets of Haiti. Please use your blue multi-purpose envelope, mark missino of the month and place in Sunday's offering plate or mail to the church office. Thank you.

Amazingly, the original name for this standard was *Tinkle Bells.* Fortunately, Jay Livingston's wife burst out laughing after first hearing the song, explaining that the word "tinkle" was just not going to work; therefore it was changed to its' memorable name <u>Silver Bells.</u>

Last year's Christmas time was filled with fear and trepidation. May we experience the warm words this musical team imparted to us --Children laughing, People passing, Meeting smile after smile. Trivia: Jay Livingston's tombstone has inscribed words of another of his hits—Que Sera, Sera.


GLORIA IN EXCELSIS DEO!!

Grace: A Community of Caring

We all want to have the fear of COVID to be gone. We have worked through almost two years of the pandemic. Many have been ill and many of died. While the communities in Minnesota have opened up, we are facing increasing rates of COVID. As of mid-November, Minnesota has the highest incidence of Covid cases in the nation. Hospitalizations are up and ICU beds are reaching capacity. We see some schools closing again due to COVID and some people are choosing not to be vaccinated. COVID is not done. Grace needs to stay vigilant to protect our members, provide a safe environment, and preserve a community of caring.

- We reopened Grace based on the COVID rates going down and the majority of the congregation being vaccinated.
- The Reopening Task Force established safe practices for worship and meetings:
 - ◊ Wash Hands
 - ◊ Maintain Social Distancing including spacing in the pews.
 - Wear Masks
 - Output Use Hand Sanitizer
 - ◊ Stay Home if you don't feel well.
 - ◊Get vaccinated and get the booster when available.
- These practices are still critically important as we move into winter.

During the Annual Meeting, members expressed concern that we seem to have relaxed the practices to help keep our community safe. The Reopening Task Force and Council have determined that we will request that we honor the safe practices of maintaining social distancing and wearing masks. We will be doing a survey to see how members feel about worshipping in the sanctuary and online. We will continue to offer choices in services including in the church, online, and on the phone.
