
chirps and calls of the birds. An owl made a visit in the night sounding very close by in the oaks. What a wonderful world God has given us.

Happy New Year!

One of the definitions for Epiphany is revelation, insight and manifestation of Christ.

This is my last President's Report after four years as President at Grace Lutheran Church. It has been an honor and privilege to serve the congregation. The executive teams and council over these past years have been great. We had a strong team working on Strategic Planning prior to Covid. The metrics and design are still important and relevant. Though we had strong team members who had done strategic planning in their professionals, we continue to have difficulty executing actions and maintaining a momentum of change. The congregation continues to point out that we continue to do a lot of talking but not enough doing. Maybe it continues to reflect our inability to claim the change we need to be strong in the future. We've all worked hard to navigate through the challenges of Covid.

We had a great team that develop protocols for a safe and healthy return to worship in the sanctuary. We improved security, air quality, and safe social distancing. We were fortunate to have technology for the online and hybrid services. We are committed to continuing to improve the delivery and ministry.

Our key proposed metrics for 2020 included focusing on people and partnerships.

Increase average Sunday worship attendance through:

New members (community outreach)

More visitors (community outreach)

Revitalized worship to attract more worshipers (worship and music ministry).

Increase net membership.

Increase number of people serving in ministries.

Increase new partnerships.

A goal to increase participation will enliven the congregation and create stronger bonds within the congregation.

Then Covid hit and we put this planning on hold. It is important to return to these metrics for growth. I hope that the Council will focus on planning for the future with clear expected actions and measures.

One of our metrics for strategic planning was developing more partnerships. We worked for three years across Covid, on hosting a charter school. The school had difficulty launching and Grace decided that we couldn't continue to wait for this partner to use our space. Another opportunity has opened up with the Lutheran Social Services Families Together Trauma Day Care. We won't know the status of this until mid-2023.

The Council used the book *The Post-Pandemic Church* to help guide our work during and after Covid. This book can still serve as a resource for the future. It is clear that we are in a different environment and continue to be challenged to sustain and thrive.

Currently, we are waiting to hear more from Met Council and Minnesota Department of Transportation regarding our second appraisal. They have received our proposal and we hope to hear from them soon. Property Management will be taking on the liaison responsibility with them.

Music Notes -

During our long stint of hibernation when Covid-19 was at full force and while we all took shelter from the devastating virus, there strangely emerged a plus side to our "hunkering down"—time to read (along with more practicing). In some cases, rereading articles and books. One of the magazines that was reread was *The American Organist* which included a letter from a very active substitute organist. He gave several examples of why the prelude organists play at the beginning of a service should be discontinued. His main reason was based on the noise level created right before the service begins i.e. loud talking which in some cases included guffaws. He gave examples from all different denominations including synagogues. In fact, a prominent synagogue in New York *City eliminated* preludes because of the noise level.

The subject of greeting friends, especially valuing them even more after the length of time not being able to be in their presence and possibly even losing them from such an illness, is tricky. Some say the greetings should be done after the service, at coffee hour. But what if they don't stay for that time together? It's a conundrum.

So the question must be asked—What is the role of the prelude? Is it a 5 minute warning signal that the service is about to begin i.e. take your seats, please. Is the prelude technically a part of the service?

In a sense it is, because usually the music chosen is a reflection on one of the hymns that will later be sung. Does it benefit the congregant in any way? Yes, because it tunes in on that particular hymn, offering another perspective, deepening the meaning of the text, which in itself, is a commentary on the theme of the day. A comment that is frequently heard: "Those hymns really paired up with the sermon and scripture reading". That was not a fluke. The hymns sung that day were thoughtfully chosen by a team, honing in, supporting the text being read that day. Sometimes it's hard to do that, but 90% of the time it works, which means the prelude and oft times, the postlude, are extensions of that theme. Therefore, the prelude and postlude are approximately 5 minute extensions of the service.

We just travelled through the season of Advent, followed by too short of a Christmas season. Advent's theme was to *Prepare* for baby Jesus' coming; in other words, a *Prelude* to his birth. Preludes help you to prepare for what's being offered to you that day—scriptures that, even though thousands of years old, continue to have deep meaning, paired by sermons and hymns that help us find deeper meaning from those scriptures. These are gifts given to you, passed on by the recipients of talents first given from the original Giver. Enjoy!



FROM THE LIBRARY:


