Dear family and friends of Grace,

Do you have food traditions? Some of our greatest and most cherished memories revolve around meals, holidays, events and the food that This Spring, Grace will be hosting a Spring was served at those times. Food has a wav of connecting us to one another, to our heritage, to our roots, and to our traditions.

My mother made German Potato Salad every Autumn for over 200 people at a Scouting event. As a child, I disliked the intense smell of vinegar in the house when she cooked the sauce to pour over the sliced potatoes that were already cooked to a melt in your mouth consistency. I didn't care for the taste and couldn't quite understand the excitement of the adults and my siblings over this delectable dish. Of course, she made it at other times during the year for our family but she always made something else for me.

Over the years, I have come to cherish this warm comfort food lovingly made by my mother's hands all those times to feed so manv. I have discovered that the recipe came from my paternal grandmother who brought it from Milwaukee to St. Paul. The recipe has been handed down for generations through my family. I make this comfort food now several times each year and enjoy every bite. My four sons have developed a love for Grandma's German Potato Salad. Now it is Son #3 who makes it for 200 people at that same Scouting event. Together, my sons are carrying on the tradition of leading and planning the event just like my dad did with mom's help.

Through food, we learn of our own heritage and that of other cultures. We live in a global world



where we can have egg rolls one day and naan with tikka masala the next. Food is truly a language of life, love, and friendship.

We had a small patch growing next to the garage. I learned to take the rhubarb and dip it in sugar. The sweetness softened the sour taste of the rhubarb. Looking through our church cookbooks – most church ladies have created many of these – I discovered names and recipes of saints from long ago. In my mother's 1960 church cookbook, I found rhubarb jam by Elsie W. and two kinds of rhubarb pie by Thelma Y. - friends of my grandmother. In our anniversary cookbook here at Grace, there are many recipes for rhubarb. Sonja K's rhubarb crunch, Florence K's rhubarb bars, and so many more recipes from saints no longer with us as well as those we still see here at Grace. Just reading the recipes brings back memories of friendship and laughter and faithful servants.

The Bible tells us: "Taste and see that the Lord is good. For the LORD is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations." May we continue to be faithful servants as we taste and see the goodness of God from one generation to another.

Music Notes -

A few weeks ago someone asked about the history of the organ. Here is a capsulized version .

Back in the 200's A.D. a Greek inventor by the name of Ctesibius discovered that air moving through a pipe would create a sound; one pipe=one sound. He used water to pump the air through the pipe. By the 500's the Romans had made bellows with a pump to force the air through. Within 100 years after that, this invention came to all of Europe to be used not in church yet but for public events. The instrument had a raucous sound, not very pretty, but very loud.

Experimenting was also being done with small more portable organs. An organ appropriately named the *portable* could be held on your lap, one hand playing the notes and the other pumping the bellow. Emporer Constantine sent one to King Pepin the Short (really?) in 757 and as off-spring sometimes do, his son Charlemagne wanted one too. He received his *portable* in 812. A larger organ called the *positive* could be carted around by a few men and used in homes or social events. It had a few more sounds and is still used today in performing Baroque music such as for Bach's cantatas.

Now people started experimenting with the types of material the pipes were made of along with their height and width, creating different types of sounds. By 400 years later in the 900's a large organ was installed in Windsor Cathedral in England. It had 400 pipes, 26 bellows, 2 keyboards having 40 keys each and 70 men to pump those bellows. Having a group of pipes creating the same type sound became common by the mid-1400's. Now the sounds could be loud or soft, much more pleasant.

The first sounds being created were attempts to imitate existing instruments i.e. flute, cromorne (similar to the oboe), trompete. The sounds chosen depended upon the organ's use. The Northern European organ sounds needed to support a choir, whereas the French/Italian/Spanish needed pieces to support parts of the Catholic Mass.

In the 1500's pedals were added to the organ, but not as sophisticated as today's version. The pedalboard was flat, played with only the toes. Another brilliant invention was the swell box, first scene in 1712. It could control how loud the organ was by opening and closing the area where the pipes were. Very soon after that, an additional control was added—the Crescendo Pedal which could add sounds without needing to pull the knobs out by hand, thus creating a layering affect.

After all these inventions, something had to give. In 1536 in England, the counter-culture, namely the Protestants, felt nothing but scripture should be used in a service, that "singing and saying of the

mass, matins, or evensong, is but roaring, howling, whistling, mummying, conjuring, and jogeling and the playing at the organ a foolish vanity". By 1562 a paper was given saying "that the psalms may be sung distinctly by the whole congregation; and that organs may be laid aside". The organs found in cathedrals throughout England were beautifully built, many of them can still be heard today. Unfortunately, many also were destroyed under the edict issued in 1644 that said, "all organs and the frames or cases wherein they stand, in all churches and chapels shall be taken away and utterly defaced, and none other hereafter set up in their places".

What happened next? How did we get to having such great English music by Ralph Vaughan Williams and his cohorts? Read what happened next in Part B, the rest of the story.
