March In Touch with Grace





Dear Family and friends of Grace,

We are in the midst of Lent. A few weeks ago on Valentine's Day, we heard the words: "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return." It's a sobering reminder of the passing of life. No matter how rich or poor someone is, we all face the same fate at the end of our journey on earth. A musician named Kerry Livgren of the American rock band Kansas was practicing his guitar one day and the song 'Dust in the Wind' came to him. The lyrics have a philosophical view of life – money, possessions, buildings, and our mortality all crumble to dust eventually. The song shows plainly the inevitable and fleeting essence of our existence, symbolizing our lives and achievements as mere dust in the wind. The lyrical narrative illustrates the temporality of our dreams, actions, and everything we cling to will eventually be gone. "Dust in the wind; all they are is dust in the wind."

Interestingly, Kerry didn't want to share the song he had composed with his band mates, but at the encouragement of his wife, he shared it reluctantly and they loved it. Dust in the Wind was recorded in 1977 and became the best-selling record that Kansas ever recorded. Kerry became a Christian a few years later.

The theme of this song resonates with many of us at one time or another especially during Lent. We might wonder at times what is this life all about? Why am I here and what difference does my life make? We find the theme of dust or ashes ties into scripture from Genesis and also Ecclesiastes as well as a few Psalms. Even with the truth of these lyrics, we know the rest of the story. We are beloved children of God. We have been given gifts and abilities to make God's world a better place. Scripture tells us that out of the dust and ashes of

our lives, God will create something beautiful and at the end of our lives, we are brought to our heavenly home, to the place prepared for us. (John 14)

Our theme this Lent is just that thought which is found in the book of Isaiah, chapter 61, verse 3: God will give beauty for ashes. Each Wednesday in Lent, we are looking at some of the great hymns of promise that have come out of desperate times, when all the world seemed like dust in the wind for each composer. Join us for soup suppers and worship each Wednesday in March. Also, on the first Sunday in March and again in April, we will look at our own legacies in a two part series. Who will remember us, how do we want to be remembered, what will we leave behind for others that will create a more beautiful world? We will look at funeral planning, end of life decisions, medical directives, and more. Join us so that together, we will remember that the Lord has promised us more than just dust in the wind, for you are loved and you matter.

The Lenten Challenge

Join the East Side Collaborative Lutheran churches (Arlington Hills, Grace, Gustavus Adolphus and Our Redeemer) for another great Lenten challenge—similar to last year! It will consist of the 40 days of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14, and ends on the Saturday (March 30) before Easter Sunday, March 31. During Lent, many people choose to give up something or do something additional to reflect on God's blessings in our lives. We are challenging you to do both! Throughout the 40 days, we will give you suggestions or guidance such as reading a scripture, praying for a specific need, calling a friend or shut-in, listening to a hymn, walking around your neighborhood (or within your building complex), giving up an item from your home to give to someone in need, etc. Coming soon, we will make available a "Challenge" guide along with a paper bag for your donations to be given to the Alley Shoppe at Arlington Hills that has provided clothing and household goods to families in need since 1970.

Did you know that the 40 days of Lent do not include Sundays? Here's some history: Since all Sundays—and not simply Easter Sunday—were days to celebrate Christ's Resurrection, Christians were forbidden to fast and do other forms of penance on those days. Therefore, when the Church expanded the period of fasting and prayer in preparation for Easter from a few days to 40 days (to mirror Christ's fasting in the desert, before He began His public ministry), Sundays could not be included in the count. Therefore, in order for Lent to include 40 days on which fasting could occur, it had to be expanded to six full weeks (with six days of fasting in each week) plus four extra days— Ash Wednesday and the Thursday, Friday, and Saturday that follow it.

MARCH MISSION OF THE MONTH

The mission of the month for March at Grace is Every Meal. Every Meal was established to provide meals to children who face food insecurities over the weekend. Minnesota students receive free breakfast and lunch at school Monday through Friday but often go without much to eat over the weekend.

Food items are packed at the warehouse in Roseville and discretely placed in child's backpack on the day before the weekend. Anyone interested in volunteering may call the church office.

The closest school to Grace which benefits from this program is Nokomis Montessori South Campus on White Bear Ave. and Third St.

Please prayerfully consider reaching out to local students who face hunger over the weekend so they can arrive at school Monday morning prepared to learn. Your donation in any amount can make a difference.

Music Notes -

Starting the first Friday of January, I have been taking a course called "The Theology of Hymns'. We have worked our way through a rather thick textbook called "Sing with Understanding" by C. Michael Hawn. It tackles all the major sections of denominational hymnals, including ours. As our final project, we were asked to (voluntarily) add a section that is not covered in the textbook, which would include hymn suggestions. I chose to present hymns on the aging process. All of us do it—until we don't. In the back of our hymnal, found on page 1184, is a list of hymns recommended under the title **Journey**, **Pilgrimage** which help immensely, but don't necessarily highlight the various stages. The following is a portion of the paper I submitted, including a list of hymns that I recommended.

Within most hymnals can be found sections containing hymns concerning hope, trust, witnessing, commitment and praise, along with highlighting the various seasons of the church year. These hymns are helpful to sustain our daily lives. Many of the hymns are restatements of psalms; many are commentaries on our relationship with God, Jesus or the Holy Spirit. But what about hymns that acknowledge our aging process and the various stages of attaining it? Concerning advanced age, Proverbs 16:31 says, "Gray hair is a crown of splendor; it is attained in the way of righteousness". In Psalm 92:14 we are reminded, "They will still bear fruit in old age, they will stay fresh and green". Comfort comes in Isaiah's words found in chapter 46, verse 4, "Even to your old age and gray hairs I am He, I am He who will sustain you. I have made you and I will carry you; I will sustain you and I will rescue you". These are words that need to be reinforced throughout the various stages of the journey.

The two hymns I examined for their emphasis on the journey were "I Was There to Hear Your Borning Cry" and "Lord of All Hopefulness", each going through the stages of life. A hymn with a familiar tune but new words that was also highlighted was #792, "When Memory Fades", which focuses on the loss of memory, vision being affected and sometimes fact recall being fuzzy. Check it out. Mary Bringle has done a good job on capsulizing some interesting points - been there, done that moments.
