Come Be a Part of the Worship Team! Part 2

As promised, here are descriptions for each opportunity to join the Worship Team.

Greeters - all ages, arrive by 9:10, greet people at the lower level before the service

Ushers – all ages, arrive by 9:10, hand out bulletins, gather offering, help direct Communion, tidy Sanctuary after worship

Acolyte - all ages (with adult assistance if younger than 5th grade), arrive by 9:15, robe for festival services, light candles before the service, assist with communion during service, extinguish candles at end of service,

Lay Reader - all ages, arrive by 9:15, read the scripture lesson during worship

Liturgist - Confirmed members, arrive by 9:15, robe for most services, assist with leading the service, help serve Communion

Communion Assistant - Confirmed members, arrive by 9:20, robe for festival services, assist serving communion during service

Money Counter - Confirmed member, count offering money after the service

Chancel Care Assistant - all ages (with adult supervision if younger than 5th grade), after the service, assist in tidying up the altar area, putting away communion ware.

Sunday Fellowship Treats Provider – all ages (with adult participation), set up treats before the service, including making coffee, serve treats during Fellowship following the service, clean up after Fellowship time.

There will be specific instruction given for each position.

Accommodations can be made for all abilities. Examples: Lay Readers can read from the floor, or the pew instead of the lectern. Communion Assistants can sit or stand behind a tray on a table while "saying the words" to serve communion. Ushers may sit while handing out bulletins.

Sign up sheets will be posted in the Good Shepherd Lounge after Easter. Please consider signing up to serve at least a couple of times during the summer. We appreciate your willingness to be part of the team!

Music Notes -

Aldous Huxley, the author of *Brave New World*, said, "After silence, that which comes nearest to expressing the inexpressible is music. One good thing about music, when it hits you, you feel no pain. Music is a moral law." That can apply to all music, whether it be written for church or for the outside world such as for movies.

Two composers, born on May 10th 11 years about, are recognized as founders of movie music. Before Max Steiner, soundtracks behind movies were mostly snippets of classical music. Max Steiner was the one who convinced the producer of *King Kong* to have new music created for its' soundtrack. He hired an 80 piece orchestra. For the first time, music demonstrated how it could manipulate the audience's emotions, adding an additional layer to remembering scenes. How do you feel when you hear those 2 screechy high violin notes from *Psycho?* Or those two very low notes from *Jaws?* Steiner built on a technique developed by Wagner called *leitmotivs*. Each character had its' own theme, something John Williams does in his movie music.

One of the most memorable scores Steiner wrote besides King Kong was a movie score 3 hours long which he took 3 months to complete *-Gone with the Wind*. Sometimes he worked 20 hours straight, assisted by daily doses of Benzedrine. That score is ranked #2 as America's greatest film score by the American Film Institute.

In contrast, born on May 10th eleven years later, Dimitri Tiomkin really wanted to be a concert pianist. He studied with some of the best in Russia. After the Revolution though, many musicians moved to Berlin or other places to find steady work. While in Berlin he continued his concert career, eventually joining another pianist to become a duo. The two were invited to come to the U.S. to perform in vaudeville as well as accompany ballet performances.

After the Stock Market Crash, Tiomkin moved to Hollywood to find more work. Even though he wanted to continue his concert career, that ended abruptly when he broke his arm. At about the same time, he met a movie director by the name of Frank Capra who commissioned him to write his first big score Lost Horizon.

Ă funny story about how music can influence a movie: the movie *High Noon*, before it was released to the public, was seen as a total flop. Tiomkin had written its' theme song, "Do Not Forsake Me, O My Darlin'". He recorded it, getting it on the radio and it was an instant success. Four months later they released the month and because of the theme song, the movie earned 4 Academy Awards, 2 going to Tiomkin.

Tiomkin would really do his homework when developing his scores. He would time each scene down to the second, approaching each segment like a term paper. He would meet with the actors, analyzing their voices for pitch and rhythm. Since he was the first composer to write both the theme song and the score, he integrated that song throughout the movie. Remember that the next time you watch It's a Wonderful Life.

How does film music relate to church music? If you attended our Palm Sunday, Good Friday or Easter Sunday service, how did the music play an active role? The choir, organ, instrumental music, how did it add that additional layer to the message and the atmosphere created? These two composers refreshed our spirits, adding their special gifts to years of movie enjoyment.

<u>All The Rivers</u> - A controversial, award winning story about the passionate but untenable affair between an Israeli Woman and a Palestinian man, from one of Israel's most acclaimed novelists.
