Music Notes -

At the end of November America celebrates the great feast of Thanksgiving, a time to thank the Lord for the fruits grown and all good gifts imparted to us. Thanksgiving not only brings out a chance to celebrate good food and friends, but also gives a chance to demonstrate how artists show America. Magazines are not in circulation as much now as they were 50 years ago. One of the most popular magazines was The Saturday Evening Post. The cover illustrator was a

painter by the name of Norman Rockwell, who painted pictures capturing the everyday life of Americans.

Just as Norman Rockwell painted scenes of American life, Aaron Copland composed the musical sounds that create the singular imagery of America. Other composers captured musical spirit of their native lands i.e. Edvard Grieg (Norway), Ralph Vaughn Williams (England) and Bela Bartok (Hungary). But Copland's music sounds uniquely American. On November 2nd, All Saints Day, the choir sings Copland's At the River, his arrangement of hymn #423, written by Robert Lowry a century earlier. It's part of a 5 piece song cycle written in 1952, a second set that followed a 4 piece grouping written for baritone soloist, commissioned by the English composer Benjamin Britten to represent American musical genres called "Old American Songs". That grouping included Copland's arrangement of the hymn "Tis a Gift to be Simple". He also made that Shaker hymn the basis for Martha Graham's ballet Appalachian Spring. Amazingly, he was one of 141 artists who were on the McCarthy list of Communist influencers. In fact, his Lincoln Portrait was removed from the presidential concert given at President Eisenhower's inauguration, even though his music so highly represented the American sound.

Aaron Copland was born November 14, 1900 and died of Alzheimer's on December 2, 1990.

Another composer, born in November, and whose tunes we hear every July 4th nicknamed "The American March King" a.k.a. John Philip Sousa, was born on November 6, 1854. Some fun facts: He wrote 130 marches, including one for the University of Minnesota. There was even a movie, loosely based on his life, called "Stars and Stripes Forever". Did you know in the early 1900's you could join the Army as young as 13 as an apprentice? That's what Sousa did, playing violin in the Army band.

So whether we're celebrating November with the changing colors all around us, or thanking God for having food on the table, surrounded by family and friends, or cherishing the artistic gifts shared with us by such creative souls as Norman Rockwell, Aaron Copland or John Philip Sousa, we have so much to be thankful for, even more so in stressful times.

<u>A Step of Faith</u> by Richard Paul Evans - After the death of his beloved wife, after the loss of his advertising business to his once-trusted partner, after bankruptcy forced him from his home, Alan Christoffersen is a broken man. Leaving everything he knows, he sets out on an extraordinary cross-country journey; with only the pack on his back, he is walking from Seattle to Key West - the end of the map.

Along the way, Alan begins to heal, meeting people who teach him lessons about love, sacrifice, and forgiveness. But in St. Louis, Alan faces another life-changing crisis, and now the Journey is in jeopardy.

The Boys In The Boat by Daniel James Brown - It was an unlikely quest from the start. With a team composed of the sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the University of Washington's eight-oar crew team was never expected to defeat the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain, yet they did, going on to shock the world by defeating the German team rowing for Adolf Hitler. The emotional heart of the tale lies with Joe Rantz, a teenager without family or prospects, who rows not only to regain his shattered self-regard but also to find a real place for himself in the world. Drawing on the boys' own journals and vivid memories of a once-in-a-lifetime shared dream, Brown has created an unforgettable portrait of an era.

NEW COLLECTION OPPORTUNITY!!!



Come Be a Part of the Worship Team!

Here are descriptions for each opportunity to join the Worship Team.

Greeters - all ages, arrive by 9:10, greet people at the lower level before the service

Ushers - all ages, arrive by 9:10, hand out bulletins, gather offering, help direct Communion, tidy Sanctuary after worship

Acolyte – all ages (with adult assistance if younger than 5th grade), arrive by 9:15, robe for festival services, light candles before the service, assist with communion during service, extinguish candles at end of service,

Lay Reader - all ages, arrive by 9:15, read the scripture lesson during worship

Liturgist - Confirmed members, arrive by 9:15, robe for most services, assist with leading the service, help serve Communion

Communion Assistant - Confirmed members, arrive by 9:20, robe for festival services, assist serving communion during service

Money Counter - Confirmed member, count offering money after the service

Chancel Care Assistant - all ages (with adult supervision if younger than 5^{th} grade), after the service, assist in tidying up the altar area, putting away communion ware.

Sunday Fellowship Treats Provider – all ages (with adult participation), set up treats before the service, including making coffee, serve treats during Fellowship following the service, clean up after Fellowship time.

Sign up sheets can be found on the island in the Narthex, and the fellowship sign-up is in the South Tower room. Please prayerfully consider how you can serve, and SIGN UP! We need you!
