DECEMBER MISSION OF THE MONTH

The Mission of the month for December at Grace is Second Stork. Second Stork provides families in need with essential newborn care items to give their baby a safe and healthy start.

Welcoming a newborn into the world should be a joyous and hopeful time! The reality is that many new parents are financially stretched, anxious and unprepared to bring their baby home from the hospital. Often, they don't have the basic supplies to keep the baby safe and healthy during those first few weeks of life. By basic, they mean a safe place to sleep, an adequate supply of diapers and wet wipes, newborn clothing and blankets. Second Stork can bridge an approximate 2 week gap from the time a newborn is discharged from the hospital to when family support or social services become available. Second Stork believes every baby should have a safe and healthy beginning.

Second Stork

Helping new parents in need

Music Notes -

A Christmas carol that is not in our hymnal but known by everyone, was written by a poet with a Minnesota connection. The lyrics to "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day" were written by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, the author of "The Song of Hiawatha". There's even a Longfellow Park. He never visited Minneapolis, but he wrote a story poem which was based on Ojibwa and Dakota legends. Parts of his poem are not necessarily accurate, but the style is very readable.

Longfellow's personal life was filled with tragedy. His first wife died from a miscarriage; he remarried 7 years later and together they had 6 children. But that marriage ended in tragedy also; she died from something horrendously painful—her dress caught on fire. Longfellow went into a long period of depression. The Civil War started about two years after her death. He wrote many poems concerning his feelings toward slavery and the numerous moral issues that divided families. The Christmas carol is based on his poem "Christmas Bells", written on Christmas Day in 1863. The movie "I Heard the Bells", dealing with the circumstances on how he wrote his poem, came out in 2022 and can be rented from the Saint Paul Public Library. Here are the original words, found at poets.org. Academy of American Poets, retrieved in 2019.

I heard the bells on Christmas Day The belfries of all Christendom Had rolled along The unbroken song Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Till ringing, singing on its way,
The world revolved from night to day,
A voice, a chime,
A chant sublime
Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

It was as if an earthquake rent The hearth-stones of a continent, And made forlorn The households born Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: "God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; The Wrong shall fail, The Right prevail, With peace on earth, good-will to men."

And thought how, as the day had come, Their old, familiar carols play, And wild and sweet The words repeat Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Then from each black, accursed mouth
The cannon thundered in the South,
And with the sound
The carols drowned
Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

And in despair I bowed my head;
"There is no peace on earth," I said;
"For hate is strong,
And mocks the song
Of peace on earth, good-will to men!"

In 1872 the organist John Calkin set the poem to the tune "Waltham" as a processional. There have been other musical versions of it, the most recent being by the Christmas composer Johnny Marks (Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree, Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer, etc.). It has since been recorded several times by such singers as Bing Crosby and Johnny Cash.

And Longfellow's message, as so many carols do, continues to resonate, continues to hold meaning, looking past the gift buying and the stressful hassle, zeroing in on the central meaning of the celebration we call Christmas.

<u>A Step of Faith</u> by Richard Paul Evans - After the death of his beloved wife, after the loss of his advertising business to his once-trusted partner, after bankruptcy forced him from his home, Alan Christoffersen is a broken man. Leaving everything he knows, he sets out on an extraordinary cross-country journey; with only the pack on his back, he is walking from Seattle to Key West - the end of the map.

Along the way, Alan begins to heal, meeting people who teach him lessons about love, sacrifice, and forgiveness. But in St. Louis, Alan faces another life-changing crisis, and now the Journey is in jeopardy.

The Boys In The Boat by Daniel James Brown - It was an unlikely quest from the start. With a team composed of the sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the University of Washington's eight-oar crew team was never expected to defeat the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain, yet they did, going on to shock the world by defeating the German team rowing for Adolf Hitler. The emotional heart of the tale lies with Joe Rantz, a teenager without family or prospects, who rows not only to regain his shattered self-regard but also to find a real place for himself in the world. Drawing on the boys' own journals and vivid memories of a once-in-a-lifetime shared dream, Brown has created an unforgettable portrait of an era.



Lay Reader - all ages, arrive by 9:15, read the scripture lesson during worship


Liturgist - Confirmed members, arrive by 9:15, robe for most services, assist with leading the service, help serve Communion
