Dear family and friends of Grace,

Happy New Year! Welcome to Epiphany - which is the name of the season after Christmas. Epiphany is a time when we see God revealed in Jesus. The 12th Day of Christmas is the first day of Epiphany. Advent and Christmas were all about waiting and preparing for Jesus. Now we are to seek Jesus in our daily lives and follow where he might be leading us in this coming year. The Gospel of Matthew tells us of the arrival of the Magi from the East who sought diligently for the Christ Child, bringing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

In an article on Epiphany, Rev. Dr. Ruth Barton wondered what the Magi had to leave behind in order to take such a strange, lengthy, and dangerous journey. One of my favorite poems at this time of year is by Howard Thurman. I have shared it before. It goes like this: "When the song of the angels is stilled; when the star in the sky is gone; when the kings and the princes are home; when the shepherds are back with their flocks; the work

of Christmas begins. To find the lost; to heal the broken; to feed the hungry; to release the prisoner; to rebuild the nations; to bring peace among people; to make music in the heart."

As we journey into the adventure that will be 2026, may we have ordinary epiphanies of seeing God at work in our lives and the world around us; may we continue the work of Christmas; may we listen for the songs of the angels and learn to sing their songs of peace on earth, goodwill to all; may we work to embrace all that God loves; may we keep room in our hearts for new priorities, goals, and space for the sacred. May the year ahead be filled with many blessings!

Music Notes -

On the bottom right hand side of each hymn in our hymnbook are two notations—the name of the tune being sung and a series of numbers or possibly 2 or 3 letters. There may appear the word *Irregular*. What do those numbers mean? Is it a secret code?

Whereas the name that appears above the numbers refers to the melody, the numbers/letters/the word *irregular* refers to the text being sung. The numbers stand for the number of syllables in each phrase. Since every verse lines up with the same tune, those numbers apply to the numbers of syllables in each verse. Let's take for example the first hymn we'll be singing on January 4th, Once in Royal David's City, #269. The numbers appearing at the bottom on the right hand side of the page say 878777. Let's count the syllables: Once in Roy-al Da-vid's cit-y= 8. So far so good. Stood a low-ly cat-tle shed=7. Let's go on. Where a moth-er laid her ba-by=8. In a man-ger for his bed=7. Mar-y was that moth-er mild=7, followed by Je-sus Christ, her lit-tle child=7. In total we get 878777.

Why is this important? If you look in the back of the hymnal, starting on page 1199, you will find a listing, a metrical index of every hymn found in the hymnal. You will find that some hymns have a lot in common with other hymns having that same number sequence. On the other hand, "Once in Royal David's City" has only one other hymn that shares that sequence, #533 "Open Now Thy Gates of Beauty". That means we could easily use the tune to "Open Now Thy Gates of Beauty" with the words to "Once in Royal David's City". Most likely we wouldn't because a lot of tunes are married to the words they have. Also, sometimes the original tunes are in a major key whereas the alternative may be in minor, not necessarily a good fit.

On the other hand, some texts have quite a few strong alternatives. We sang #588 "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy" on December 14th that has the sequence of 8787D (D meaning 8787 another set of 8787). It has 20 other hymn tunes that could be used with that text and I grew up with those words set to a tune not found in this hymnal, so there are even more possibilities.

This can be very frustrating. Hymns can be attached to some fond memories. Augsburg Publishing House who publishes new hymn collections has utilized these number sequences in a different way. Utilizing familiar hymns can lead to introducing new hymn texts dealing with current issues meaningful to those singing them, such as aging, hunger, interfaith respect, etc.

There are other symbols to check out, i.e. CM (common meter), LM (long meter), PM (peculiar meter) as well as the aforementioned *Irregular* (they don't fit any of the categories). Check out your favorite hymns. Compare them to others that having the same number of syllable groupings. Enjoy!

What do they mean? Is it a secret code?



A Step of Faith by Richard Paul Evans - After the death of his beloved wife, after the loss of his advertising business to his once-trusted partner, after bankruptcy forced him from his home, Alan Christoffersen is a broken man. Leaving everything he knows, he sets out on an extraordinary cross-country journey; with only the pack on his back, he is walking from Seattle to Key West - the end of the map.

Along the way, Alan begins to heal, meeting people who teach him lessons about love, sacrifice, and forgiveness. But in St. Louis, Alan faces another life-changing crisis, and now the Journey is in jeopardy.

The Boys In The Boat by Daniel James Brown - It was an unlikely quest from the start. With a team composed of the sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the University of Washington's eight-oar crew team was never expected to defeat the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain, yet they did, going on to shock the world by defeating the German team rowing for Adolf Hitler. 
Sunday School classes will resume on January 4th.


2026 Collections



Lay Reader - all ages, arrive by 9:15, read the scripture lesson during worship


Liturgist - Confirmed members, arrive by 9:15, robe for most services, assist with leading the service, help serve Communion
